Today, the Air Force's dress and appearance regulations are codified in **AFI 36 2905** (Uniform Regulations) and **AFI 36 2800** (Grooming Standards). These documents are regularly reviewed to incorporate new materials, technologies, and societal changes.

Key Dress Uniforms in the Air Force

Below is a breakdown of the main dress uniforms used by Air Force personnel, including the circumstances in which each is worn.

Dress Blue is the most formal Air Force uniform, worn during official ceremonies, state functions, and formal receptions. It consists of a black jacket, black trousers, a white shirt, and a black tie. The jacket features gold or silver rank insignia, depending on the wearer's rank.

- Eligibility: All officers and enlisted personnel, regardless of rank.
- Occasions: State dinners, high level visits, parades, and graduation ceremonies.
- Accessories: A black leather belt, polished dress shoes, and a black tie (for officers).
- Special Notes: Enlisted personnel may wear a white or black shirt depending on the event, while officers must wear the white shirt.

The Dress White uniform is similar to Dress Blue but with a white jacket and black trousers. It is less formal but still used for official functions, especially in warmer climates or during certain ceremonies.

- Eligibility: All ranks.
- Occasions: Military parades, award presentations, and certain state functions.
- Accessories: Standard dress accessories, including a tie for officers.

The Flight Uniform is designed for operational duties, providing comfort and functionality while maintaining a professional appearance. It includes a flight jacket, trousers, a flight shirt, and optional flight pants.

- Eligibility: All personnel, especially those in aviation and operational roles.
- Occasions: Flight operations, training, and field duties.
- Accessories: Flight belt, flight gloves, and flight boots.

Cadets at the Air Force Academy wear a distinct uniform that reflects the Academy's traditions and the cadet's class year. The uniform includes a white shirt, black trousers, a black blazer, and a distinctive class ribbon.

- Eligibility: Cadets only.
- Occasions: Academy ceremonies, graduation, and official events.
- Accessories: Academy insignia, rank insignia, and a class ribbon.

Grooming Standards: The Invisible Uniform

Beyond clothing, the Air Force places significant emphasis on grooming. The **AFI 36 2800** outlines specific standards for hair, facial hair, makeup, and personal hygiene.

- Men: Hair must be neat, no longer than 2 inches from the scalp, and no visible hairline.
- Women: Hair must be clean, dry, and styled in a manner that does not interfere with operational duties. Long hair must be secured.
- Hair color: Natural colors are required; dyed hair must be approved by a commanding officer.
- Beards and mustaches are prohibited for all personnel.

- Clean shaven is required for all officers and enlisted members.
- Exceptions: Certain medical conditions may allow for facial hair with proper documentation.
- Makeup must be natural and modest.
- Jewelry is limited to a single pair of earrings (size 5 or larger) and a wristwatch.
- Men may wear a wedding band.
- Regular bathing, oral hygiene, and avoidance of strong fragrances are mandatory.
- All personnel must maintain a clean and tidy appearance at all times.

Rank Insignia and Badges: Signifying Authority and Achievement

Rank insignia is a key element of the Air Force's appearance system. Each rank is represented by a distinct insignia worn on the uniform's shoulders or collar.

Enlisted insignia are typically brass or silver stars and stripes. The placement and color indicate the wearer's rank:

- Airman Basic (AB) – No insignia.
- Airman (Amn) – One stripe.
- Airman First Class (A1C) – Two stripes.
- Senior Airman (SrA) – Three stripes.
- Staff Sergeant (SSgt) – Three stripes with a star.
- Technical Sergeant (TSgt) – Three stripes with a star and a wing.
- Master Sergeant (MSgt) – Three stripes with a star and a wing, plus a chevron.
- Senior Master Sergeant (SMSgt) – Three stripes with a star, wing, and chevron.
- Chief Master Sergeant (CMSgt) – Three stripes with a star, wing, and a wreath.

Officer insignia are silver stars and bars:

- Second Lieutenant (2d Lt) – One silver bar.
- First Lieutenant (1st Lt) – Two silver bars.
- Captain (Capt) – Three silver bars.
- Major (Maj) – One silver star.
- Lieutenant Colonel (Lt Col) – Two silver stars.
- Colonel (Col) – Three silver stars.
- Brigadier General (Brig Gen) – One gold star.
- Major General (Maj Gen) – Two gold stars.
- Lieutenant General (Lt Gen) – Three gold stars.
- General (Gen) – Four gold stars.
- General of the Air Force (GAF) – Five gold stars.

All insignia must be clean, polished, and affixed correctly. Improper placement or tarnish can reflect poorly on the wearer and the unit.

Uniform Accessories: Completing the Look

Accessories play a pivotal role in the Air Force's appearance standards. They not only enhance the uniform's aesthetic but also serve functional purposes.

- Cap: The Air Force officer cap features a black visor and a gold or silver cap device, depending on rank.
- Helmet: Used by aircrew and ground personnel for safety during flight operations.
- Belts must be black leather for dress uniforms and tan for operational uniforms.
- Buckles should match the uniform color and be polished.

- Dress boots are black leather and must be polished daily.
- Operational boots are durable, with a high visibility color for safety.
- Gloves are optional for flight operations but must be clean and functional.

All personnel are expected to wear a functional wristwatch. The watch should be clean, accurate, and non reflective to maintain a professional appearance.

Special Uniforms and Exceptions

While the standard dress and operational uniforms cover most scenarios, there are special cases where alternative attire is authorized:

- Medical Personnel: May wear scrubs or medical dress uniforms that differ from standard dress.
- Technical and Engineering Units: Some units allow for specialized workwear with added safety features.
