

how to make paracord lanyards

Thread the end of the paracord through the clip's hole. Pull the cord through until you have about 1–2 inches of slack. This slack allows you to adjust the length after the knot is tied.

1. Hold the clip end in your left hand and the free end in your right.
2. Wrap the free end around the clip twice to create a loop.

7. Trim the excess to 1/4 inch beyond the knot.

Once tied, your lanyard should hold securely and look tidy. If you prefer a different look, experiment with decorative knots such as the *Double Loop Knot* or the *Fisherman's Knot*.
