For each chord, play:

- Downstroke on the 1st beat
- Upstroke on the “and” of the 1st beat
- Downstroke on the 2nd beat
- Upstroke on the “and” of the 2nd beat

5.2. Bridge Strumming Variation

The bridge requires a slightly different feel. Use a more syncopated pattern to add contrast:

- Downstroke on the 1st beat

- Downstroke on the “and” of the 2nd beat
