SAT/ACT Scores

High School GPA

Medical Red Flags

Conditions that pose a significant risk to flight safety or operational readiness—such as uncontrolled seizures or severe heart disease—are typically disqualified.

Legal Issues

Unresolved legal matters, ongoing investigations, or a history of repeated offenses can lead to denial.

Academic Shortcomings

Failing to meet the minimum GPA or standardized test score thresholds without a compelling mitigating circumstance often results in rejection.

Appealing a Waiver Denial in 2012

Appeal Process
